### Fr. John Hagreen, RIP

Fr. John Hagreen, the eldest brother to two sisters was born on 24th May 1919 at Hampstead. His father, Philip Hagreen, was a widely reputed engraver in wood, whose particular skill was lettering. When his sight failed his wife, Aileen took Philip to Lourdes where his sight recovered. As a result they then they lived in Lourdes for a number of years having John and his sister educated at the local boarding school.

Shortly after the return to England at the outbreak of the War, John joined the army. During his military service he was wounded by shrapnel. In 1945 after demobilisation he decided to study for the priesthood. He undertook his studies at Osterley and Wonersh. Following ordination on 8th June 1952 he served at Forest Hill for three years before being appointed to St. Peter's, Hove. After five years he went in 1960 to Our Lady of the Assumption, Northfleet where he also remained for five years. Following the creation of the new parish of St. John Fisher, Kidbrooke he became the first parish priest. In 1975 he became the parish priest of Our Lady of the Rosary, Brixton, where he served for nine years. In April 1984 he became parish priest of St. Andrew, Tenterden until 1997. In that year he was appointed as chaplain to St. Andrew's Convent, Edenbridge. In September 2001 he went to St. Thomas of Canterbury, Sevenoaks.

John served the Diocese through a number of Diocesan appointments. He was the Director of the Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes. He made a number of revisions to the CTS "A Guide to Lourdes" with a design on the last revision based on a woodcut by his father.

He also served on the Ministry to Priests Team the Art and Architecture Committee and the Marriage Tribunal. Ever active with a lively mind he had a letter published in "The Tablet" on the day of his death.

John was a gentleman. Above all he was a courteous, mannerly, devoted dedicated and prayerful priest.

He died in the Kent and Sussex hospital, Tunbridge Wells just after midnight on Friday 2nd May 2003.

May he rest in peace.
